



ESTE es el Paso que separa los hombres de los niños.” Así se expresa un clérigo muy querido nuestro que es uno de los mejores amigos de A.A. A continuación explica que cualquier persona que tenga suficiente buena voluntad y sinceridad para aplicar repetidamente el Sexto Paso a todos sus defectos de carácter—sin reserva alguna—ha llegado a alcanzar un gran desarrollo espiritual y, por lo tanto, merece que se le describa como un hombre que sinceramente intenta crecer a la imagen y semejanza de su Creador.

Naturalmente, la muy discutida pregunta de si Dios puede liberarnos de los defectos de carácter—y si, bajo ciertas condiciones, lo hará tendrá una respuesta inmediata y rotundamente afirmativa por parte de casi todo miembro de A.A. Para nosotros, ésta no es una propuesta teórica; es la mayor realidad de nuestras vidas. Casi cualquier miembro ofrecerá como prueba una exposición como ésta: “Sin duda, yo estaba vencido, totalmente derrotado. Mi fuerza de voluntad no me servía para nada frente al alcohol. Los cambios de ambiente, los mejores esfuerzos de mi familia, mis amigos, médicos, sacerdotes no tenían el menor efecto en mi alcoholismo. Simplemente, no podía dejar de beber, y no parecía que ningún ser humano pudiera conseguir que lo hiciera. Pero cuando llegué a estar dispuesto a poner mi casa en orden y luego pedí a un Poder Superior, Dios como yo Lo concebía, que me liberase de mi obsesión por beber, esa obsesión desapareció.” En reuniones de A.A. celebradas en todas partes del mundo, cada día se oyen contar experiencias como la anterior. Todo el mundo puede ver claramente que cada miembro sobrio de A.A. ha sido liberado de una obsesión obstinada y potencialmente mortal. Así que, en un sentido literal, todos los A.A. han “llegado a estar enteramente dispuestos” a dejar que Dios los liberase de la manía de beber alcohol. Y Dios ha hecho precisamente esto.

Habiendo tenido una completa liberación del alcoholismo, ¿por qué no podríamos lograr, por los mismos medios, la liberación absoluta de cualquier otra dificultad o defecto? Este es el enigma de nuestra existencia, cuya completa solución puede que exista sólo en la mente de Dios. No obstante, por lo menos podemos ver una parte de la solución. Cuando un hombre o una mujer consumen tanto alcohol que destruyen su vida, hacen algo que va completamente “contra natura.” Al desafiar su deseo instintivo de conservación, parecen estar empeñados en destruirse a sí mismos. Actúan en contra de su instinto más profundo. Conforme se ven humillados por los terribles latigazos que les da el alcohol, la gracia de Dios puede entrar en sus vidas y expulsar su obsesión. En esto su poderoso instinto de sobrevivir puede cooperar plenamente con el deseo de su Creador de darle una nueva vida. Porque tanto la naturaleza como Dios aborrecen el suicidio.

Pero la mayoría de nuestras demás dificultades no se pueden clasificar en esta categoría. Por ejemplo, cada persona normal quiere comer, reproducirse y llegar a ser alguien en la sociedad. Y desea gozar de un nivel razonable de seguridad mientras intenta alcanzar estas cosas. De hecho Dios le ha creado así. No creó al hombre para que se destruyera a sí mismo con el alcohol, sino que le dotó de instintos para ayudarlo a mantenerse vivo.

No existe la menor evidencia, al menos en esta vida, de que nuestro Creador espere que eliminemos totalmente nuestros instintos naturales. Que sepamos nosotros, no hay ningún testimonio de que Dios haya quitado a cualquier ser humano todos sus instintos naturales.

Puesto que la mayoría de nosotros nacemos con una abundancia de deseos naturales, no es de extrañar que a menudo les dejemos que se conviertan en exigencias que sobrepasan sus propósitos originales. Cuando nos impulsan ciegamente, o cuando exigimos voluntariamente que nos den más satisfacciones o placeres de los que nos corresponden, este es el punto en el que nos desviamos del grado de perfección que Dios desea que alcancemos en esta tierra. Esta es la medida de nuestros defectos de carácter o, si prefieres, de nuestros pecados.

Si se lo pedimos, Dios ciertamente nos perdonará nuestras negligencias. Pero nunca nos va a volver blancos como la nieve y mantenernos así sin nuestra cooperación. Nosotros mismos debemos estar dispuestos a hacer lo necesario para alcanzar esto. Dios solamente nos pide que nos esforcemos lo más que podamos para hacer progresos en la formación de nuestro carácter.

Por lo tanto, el Sexto Paso—“Estuvimos enteramente dispuestos a dejar que Dios nos liberase de nuestros defectos”—es la forma en que A.A. expone la mejor actitud posible que se puede tomar para dar un comienzo en este trabajo de toda la vida. No significa que esperemos ver desaparecer todos nuestros defectos de carácter como desapareció nuestra obsesión por beber. Puede que algunos desaparezcan, pero en cuanto a la mayoría de ellos, tendremos que contentarnos con una mejoría gradual. Las palabras claves “enteramente dispuestos” subrayan el hecho de que queremos aspirar lo mejor que conozcamos o que podemos llegar a conocer.

¿Cuántos de nosotros tenemos este grado de disponibilidad? En un sentido absoluto, casi nadie lo tiene. Lo mejor que podemos hacer, con toda la sinceridad que seamos capaces, es tratar de alcanzarlo. Aun entonces, los miembros más entregados y dedicados descubriremos, para nuestra consternación, que hay un punto en el que nos estancamos, un punto en el que decimos, “No, todavía no puedo renunciar a esto.” Y a menudo vamos a pisar un terreno mucho más peligroso, cuando gritemos: “¡Nunca voy a renunciar a esto!” Tal es la capacidad para sobrepasarse que tienen nuestros instintos. Por mucho que hayamos progresado, siempre encontraremos deseos que se opongan a la gracia de Dios.

Ebby T. At Calvary Mission

Following a sudden alcoholic release during the late summer of 1934, Ebby found himself under the sponsorship of Rowland H. (The “certain American businessman” mentioned on page 27). During this formative period, Rowland taught Ebby the major ingredients of the Oxford Group fellowship. Though newly sober himself, Rowland had learned much doctrine, having spent nearly three years in attendance to their house parties and conventions. Ebby’s association with Rowland and actually presenting OG talks, must have had a powerful effect on Ebby as he was going through what he described as a “Pink Cloud” period. “Pink Clouds” are typical for newly sober alcoholics, but often short lived. Apparently not so for Ebby. There was no reason not to return to Albany—certainly all would be forgiven and his brother, Jack, the Mayor, would find him a good job. His inheritance was now gone (He had inherited \$150,000 a few years previous!), so money was important, yet, instead, he followed Rowland’s offer to become a spiritual worker with the “Brotherhood of Twelve Men” at Calvary Mission. Ebby was a good listener with an exceptionally likable personality.

The Calvary Mission was walking distance from the Calvary House, where the Oxford Group meetings were held, as well as Stewart’s Cafeteria, where a small group of alcoholics, and OG members would meet after meetings. He would join Bill and Lois afterwards for fellowship. Here follow excerpts from one of Ebby’s talks about this period of 1935: “I ‘rode herd’ on Bill in the beginning and stuck by him as we attended many Oxford Group meetings. Bill got comfortable and started speaking at meetings as time went on (Bill always considered Ebby his sponsor). Those meeting were basically the same as the A.A. meetings today. Everyone had a chance to share their experience, strength and hope. Of course, the meetings were not confined to alcoholics, but those attending shared their problems and victories.

The Oxford Group was based on a return to first-century Christian fellowship. They practiced the Four Absolutes: Honesty, Unselfishness, Love and Purity, the principle of morning meditation to get in tune with “God as you understand Him,” to receive daily guidance, and to live each day as it comes along.

When a person has been around the A.A. program for any length of time they have, most likely, noticed certain different patterns of individual choices of, what is considered, recovery. That’s the wonderful thing about A.A.; each person chooses how he or she interprets what the spirit of the program is for them, and I wouldn’t have it any other way. These choices range from “I just don’t drink today” to “I’ve found a spiritual way of life that has solved all of my problems”, and everything in between. If all we wanted to do is to stop drinking alcohol we could try that approach but for most of us, we would not be happy and sooner or later most of us would try the old game again. Rarely does an alcoholic succeed simply by abstaining from alcohol.

Step six, “Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character” may sound like God does all the work in this matter but if we read further in the 12X12 it says, “But in no case does He render us white as snow and keep us that way without our cooperation. That is something we are supposed to be willing to work towards ourselves. He asks only that we try as best we know how to make progress in the building of character.” After identifying my defects of character and shortcomings in step 4 and admitting them in step 5, it is now time, With God’s guidance, to start the process of correcting them in step 6 in order to enjoy a happy and peaceful life. I believe that this is where we separate the men from the boys (women from the girls). It’s seems easy for me to deal with the more obvious shortcomings such as, being a horse thief. All I would have to do was to stop stealing horses, or a bank robber, all I would have to do is to stop robbing banks. The more difficult things to correct are the more subtle character flaws, such as: lying, gossiping, cheating, neglecting, envying, procrastinating, and all those little glitches in my character that I think, go unnoticed by the outside world. These things do not go unnoticed by my conscience and if I want to clear that up, I must be willing to seek out the solutions to these problems.

Changing these negative habits does not come easy but it can be much easier when you recognize that it is our ego that stands in between us and the solution, and it turns out to be a struggle between our ego and our conscience. There is nothing physically hard about this. It is, however, mentally difficult. This is where we must muster up all the spiritual strength we can, and, one by one, work our way through all of these superficial habits that weigh on our conscience. Once I resolve one of these issues, I find it important to draw a line in the sand and discipline myself to assure that I don’t fall into or let myself be tempted into returning to these negative habits.

Practicing principles is a common phrase among AA members. It has been said that if a person lives by principles, 99% of his/her decisions are made for that person. What separates the men from the boys, (women from the girls) from my point of view is how well that person does when the going gets tough. Do they stick to their principles, or do they take the easy way out and fall back into their old, selfish habits? That, I think is the test of our spiritual condition.

The Oxford Group meetings took place at a nine-story building called the Calvary House, located behind Calvary Church at 21st and Park Ave. South. The elegant Gramercy Park is across the street. It was once thought that if they would allow alcoholics to move into the beautiful Calvary House and treat them with agape love, why they would sober up right away. This idea was discarded after one of the drunks threw a shoe through a prestigious stained glass window. Ebby remained in service at the nearby mission till he moved in with Bill W. and his wife Lois the next year.
