**A New Holiday Perspective
Bringing Joy to the Less Fortunate**

How appropriate it seems that there are twelve months in a year, and we have twelve steps in the program. November is often referred to the Gratitude month, mainly due the celebration of Thanksgiving. The joy of good living is the theme of Step Twelve and it blends right in with the Christmas holiday season in December and ending with the New Year's Eve celebration. This time of year does bring a lot of joy to many of us but it also brings distress to some of the less fortunate ones who have yet to been blessed with the gift of sobriety and peace of mind, in and outside of A.A.

During my drinking days I used to be extremely uncomfortable about the holidays. I never knew how to act around normal people unless I was half smashed. When invited by one of my siblings to Thanksgiving dinner, I felt like a charity case and would rather just hang out at the bar where I felt safe. I never got into the spirit of reaching out to others. My family always celebrated the different holidays, especially Christmas, and I would always (due to my discomfort) put a damper on it by complaining about the tacky gifts that people would buy for each other at Christmas and the mad rush to go shopping and the commercializing facade that it had become. Any excuse was better than facing me and the miserable wretch I had become.

After being sober for several years it occurred to me that I still had some of those same attitudes, and that I was still holding on to them to some degree largely due to the inconvenience of it all. I explained this problem to a dear friend once, and he asked, "Does the rest of the family enjoy the holidays?" I said yes. He then said, "Why don't you just take a back seat and just watch the joy in their eyes as they experience these things." I did exactly what he suggested and when I started to observe my wife and two adolescent girls and the childlike innocence and happiness it brought to them; it gave me a whole new appreciation for this time of year. It brought tears of Joy to my eyes and I no longer wanted to be the grouch, putting a damper on the joy that they were having. I have been following this line of thinking ever since and it has changed my whole perspective concerning these things.

This change of attitude has inspired me to apply the unselfish lessons that I have come to understand and now I spend the holiday season filled with Joy. If it works like that for the holidays, then why can't I bring it with me for the rest of the year? This has been my mission ever since my friend suggested it, and I am always looking for the opportunity to brighten the lives of people less fortunate than myself. I try to do these things anonymously and without fanfare. I also try to consider the discomfort that I used to feel when I was the one on the receiving end of a charitable gesture. I am careful to do these things in a way that preserves the dignity of that other person. I do not have to wait for the holidays to do these things. Every day is a holiday in and outside of my home, and you can believe me when I say; I reap more than my share of the joy. I hope this brings a new perspective to those who, like me, had trouble enjoying this time of year and I hope you all have a joyful Holiday Season, and many more.

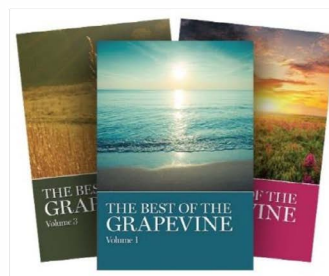

A Deeper Look at the Word: LOVE Love is as Love Does

The longer I attend A. A. meetings the more aware I become of the evolution of the subject matter of meeting topics. In my early days in the 1970s the topic was normally about drunkalogues or whatever the leader wanted to talk about that day. Most of the meetings that I attend today are literature-based meetings and there is amplifying information in the literature that reinforces the topic. On page 164 in the Big Book it says "We realize we know only a little. God will constantly disclose more to you and to us." Today we have access to all that they had learned up to that point in time plus everything we have learned since then and the sharing in the meetings is so much deeper as the result of those disclosures. I was at a meeting recently and the topic was "Love without strings" Sept. 28 in The Daily Reflections. It was interesting to hear the differing perceptions mainly based on the differing lengths of sobriety and how the word Love was perceived. I looked up the word in the Thesaurus and it is all about feelings like fondness, passion, adoration, affection, and many others. Over the years I have heard it said that "I can love him, but I don't have to like him." Is it him I don't like or is it his behavior I don't like? All of us come to A.A. with behavioral problems. It is not about him. It is about me being judgmental. There were comments about sexual attraction or "erotic love" which are common in most online definitions but that is not our purpose when dealing with the word Love. There are many definitions of the word LOVE and for our purpose, I believe the one that Scott Peck writes about in his book "The Road Less Traveled" He defines love as "The will to extend oneself for the purpose of nurturing one's own or another's spiritual growth." He implies that it is not that version that we see on the movie screen. To me this means that love is, caring for, and nurturing another person. I can love everyone, even if they do not love me back. It is not about them; it implies that it's about me and my actions. As I took this approach, one by one I defused and neutralized all those mental conflicts and accepted everyone exactly as they are. No longer do they crowd my thinking. Do those people that still have behavior problems sometimes cross my boundaries? Oh yes, they do. Sometimes their EGO is threatened by something I shared at a meeting or in the community and they need to defend their position. Today I recognize these symptoms in others, and I try to be understanding about what I say at a meeting as to not make him/her uncomfortable. This takes time and I never respond to inuendoes when someone is trying to draw me into an argument. It takes two to tango and over a period of time he gets to know who I really am, and he is no longer threatened by the thing I share. I try to Care for and Nurture everyone and at some point, in time I have run out of adversaries, that I know of, in fact, I become their best advocate. Today, the word Love is not a noun. Love is a verb. Love is as Love does. Understand them, wish the best for them, and be willing to help them when you can. Who could understand the behavior of an alcoholic more than another alcoholic who has experienced their own development in the program? The founding principles of A. A. is the caring for and nurturing of another alcoholic. If that is not love, then what is? With all my love, I rest my case.

ME LLAMO LUIS Y SOY ALCOHOLICO (Ateo)

Me dirijo a los alcohólicos que han tenido dificultades en adaptarse a las referencias religiosas dentro del programa de A.A. A aquéllos que no pueden aceptar la idea de un ser sobrenatural, permítanme decirles que siempre han sido los seres humanos quienes me han fortalecido cuando necesitaba ayuda.

Reconozco que necesito más fuerza de la que yo personalmente tengo para vencer la compulsión de beber. Recibo esta fuerza adicional del poder para crear el bien que en A.A. se genera. He interpretado la frecuente referencia a Dios en los Doce Pasos y en otros lugares, como el poder que viene de otras personas.

Después de un año y medio de verdadera sobriedad (anteriormente pasé tres años tratando de captar el programa de A.A.), sufrí una catástrofe personal. No considero esta situación como un castigo por los "pecados" del pasado; ni tampoco soy tan vanidoso como para creer que una deidad me eligió como mártir. Es ciertamente irónico verme parálítico después de un período de verdadera sobriedad, y no como resultado de una borrachera. Pero no es más que eso — irónico.

Tengo una firme creencia en la moral humana. Creo que los malos impulsos pueden ser superados por las acciones honestas. A.A. pone de manifiesto los impulsos para crear el bien, y esto tiene una fuerza tremenda. A mi parecer, el total de las buenas acciones constituye el "poder superior". Estas son las palabras de un ministro Unitario: "En un mundo que ha perdido, o que va perdiendo rápidamente, toda idea convincente de la providencia divina en acción, de un Dios que dispone de los asuntos de la humanidad, no es necesario suponer que la única alternativa a un universo amante del ser humano es un universo enemigo y satánico. Existe la alternativa más probable de un universo neutral, en donde viven los seres humanos forjando su salvación, sin esperanza del cielo ni temor del infierno. Se puede encontrar que la vida tiene un valor no porque un padre divino así lo dispone, sino porque los logros de buenos hombres y mujeres trabajando juntos con amor y respeto mutuos, son en y por sí mismos valiosos y gratificadores."

Durante más de dos años, fui casi un Solitario, pudiendo asistir solamente a unas pocas reuniones cada año. Afortunadamente, mi esposa comprende bien lo que es el alcoholismo (debido a su asociación en el pasado con un grupo familiar), y tuve la oportunidad casi diaria de tener conversaciones con ella. Ahora, hemos formado un grupo de A.A. en esta área que se reúne cada semana en mi casa. No fui capaz de aceptar a A.A. ni la ayuda verdadera que prestaba, hasta que hice una interpretación racional del programa. Sigo siendo ateo, pero soy un ateo agradecido.

No quiero cambiar a A.A. Funciona para mí. Sólo quiero que A.A. logre atraer a los racionalistas. Como miembros de A.A., ellos pueden aportar mucho a la Comunidad.

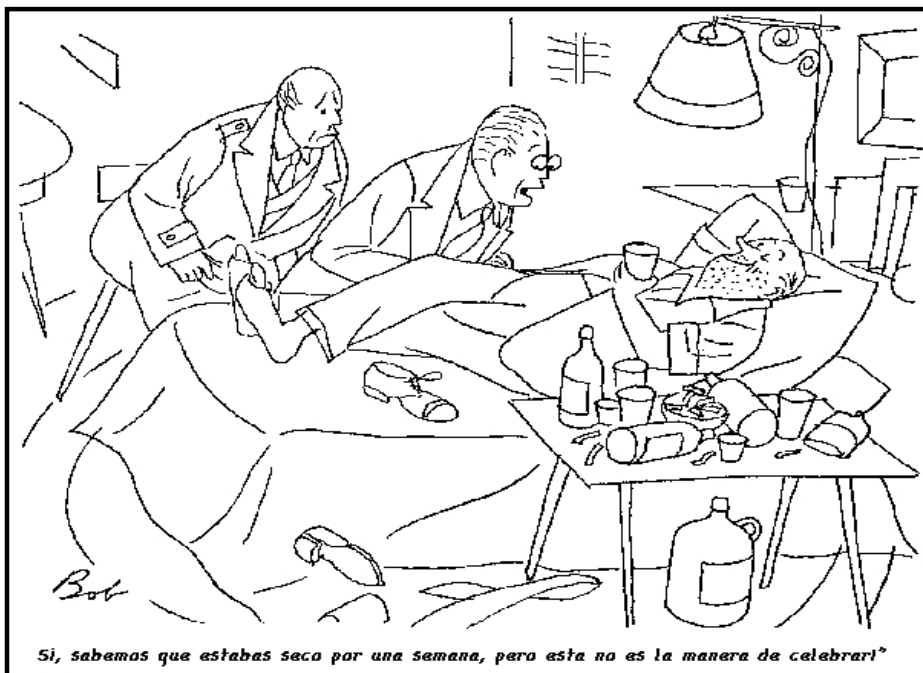

HAPPINESS VS JOY

The Big Book tells us that God wants us to be happy, Joyous, and free (p. 133). At first reading I thought this statement was a bit redundant for, after all, were not happiness and joy synonymous emotions? I was later to take a different view.



Some years ago, I attended an AA gathering in a large campground near Sault Ste. Marie, Canada. While preparing to sleep in my tent I was taken over by a tremendous sadness. It came in vivid memory the happy night where my lovely then-bridge and I spent in the same tent above the Grand Canyon following our Las Vegas marriage. At once, a heavy depression crashed down with tremendous despondency. The happy times that we shared during our California years were gone—now we were divorced—she is gone from me forever. It was far past midnight and the black doom pressed down without pity. . . and it went on and on.

But then, all at once, my surroundings seemed to brighten! It was as though a beautiful light was shining in some mysterious manner. Although I was overcome with sadness, certainly not happiness, I was at once filled with JOY! I was experiencing both sadness and JOY at the same time! This bright JOY sparkled deep into the morning.

That experience convinced me that happiness and Joy are not at all the same. Happiness is a biological phenomenon that comes and goes with life happenings. If the boss says, "you're fired," I will become sad, but if he gives me a raise, I am happy. But not so with spiritual JOY because true Joy comes from God and is not under the domain of this world. God has told us: "I am not of this world!"

True Joy has come to me spasmodically since that episode, but it comes and goes before I seem to be able to capture it, yet it is proof to me that God is with me. The Big Book speaks of the "Great Reality" deep within (p. 55). So, I believe if I live the life that AA has offered, I will continue to be mostly happy, but also experience surges of great JOY from time to time.

The Big Book promise of being happy and joyous is not redundant; this duo has helped me from taking that first drink for many years. Thank you, God!

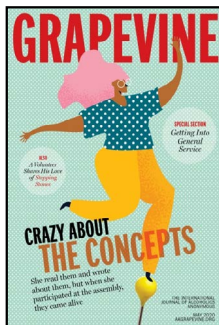
