A Simple Program for Complicated People Living by the Dictates of my Conscience

"Desperation" has been the great motivator for me with respect to the thoroughness that I have applied since the day I surrendered and came to Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) searching for solutions to my, out of control, drinking problem. Not everyone that comes to A.A. has that degree of desperation and that, I believe is the difference in the various degrees of success we, as individuals, have when it . . citizen. I had to become an asset and not a liability. I had comes to abstaining from alcohol.

The reality is that not everyone: gets it on their very first attempt. With time, comes understanding and once I: got beyond the initial stages of recovery it became clear to me that alcohol did not cause my problems although

it eventually become a problem. My mental and emotional troubles started surfacing long before I ever started drinking and I now realize that the drinking masked most of my mental and emotional difficulties for a long time but, as it happens, my tolerance for alcohol started to dissipate and the heavy drinking became an obvious problem. I failed at marriage, jobs, friendships, parenthood, and trust with just about every one that knew me. I burned so many bridges that, finally, I had no place to turn and by some miracle, I woke up one morning, and with no other options, I desperately called A. A. for help. I was finally ready and from that day on, over fifty-three years ago, I have never wanted a drink since then.

The obsession to drink has never showed its face again but had I not recognized the reason that drinking seemed to work, in the early days, and that the mental and emotional problems would be exposed when I stopped

drinking and would need to be addressed if I was ever going to be at peace with myself and with the world around me. I feel fortunate that, from that very first day, I have not been in denial about my condition and have embraced, what I recognized to be, the solution to my disease and the pathway to a future of the contentment that I enjoy today as the result of that thoroughness that I have applied to every facet of my life.

I had to relearn how to be a husband, a father, a brother, a friend, an employee, a neighbor, a partner, and a


to question my motives for everything I did and assure that I stayed on the unselfish side of the ledger. I found it helpful to revisit the everyone gets it on their spirit of the things that I learned as a child in 'Church, in School, and in the Boy Scouts... and •apply them where the selfish and dishonest habits had ruled my life. I came to understand

how my Ego had taken over all my mental properties and I had to let my Conscience slowly regain control of my virtues.

The A.A. program was there when I was ready to throw in the towel and it helped me to recognize all of these changes but it doesn't go into detail about how to meet these noble goals of how to be a good husband, father, friend,... so I had to learn from other experienced sources, the details of these neglected issues and go about reprogramming my inner self to incorporate all these components of right living.

These things take time, and they do not happen overnight, but I could not let that stop me from beginning this new journey and giving me a purpose for living. I am extremely grateful that the A.A. program was established just in time to be available to save this broken spirit and turn it into the person that I am today as I override my Ego and simply live by the dictates of my Conscience.



A Search for Humility and Happiness Not an End in Itself

On Page 70 in my version of the 12&12 it says that
'humility, as a word, is often misunderstood". When asked,
what is the opposite of humility; my first guess would be
Pride. Who could argue with that? It was in my 22nd year
of sobriety when I had a phone call from my first wife's husband at the time and the conversation started going south.
I was trying to refrain from bickering with him and when he
couldn't get any traction, he made the statement that," He
had heard stories about me in the past, and that I was no
angel. I thought about it for a few seconds and responded,

"I've done a lot of things in my live that I'm not proud of,
but I'm not ashamed of anything I've done in the last 22
years." The call ended peacefully. It didn't occur to me at the
time, but in that phone call, the polarity of pride and shame
was evident.

About 16 years later, at a step study meeting on Step Seven, the discussion of Humility came up and I listened to all the different points of view. The memory of that phone call came back, and I questioned where humility fits in. In the 12&12 Step 5, it amounts to "a clear recognition of what and who we really are followed by a sincere attempt to become what we could be". With Pride at one extreme and Shame at the other, I see Humility right in the middle. It simply means doing the things we are supposed to be doing every day and doing them without fanfare. I always knew what I was

supposed to be doing but with an overbearing sense of insecurity and neediness, seldom was I strong enough to do the right thing. I developed a sense of unworthiness that prevailed until I found a solution in the bottle which only deepened my guilt and shame. In one of my more recent articles, I explained that I was doing a little research to find the definition of the word happiness and discovered that it is often described as "a byproduct of right living, and not an end in itself"

I posed, allowing all the hundreds of diners, giving them the opportunity to read the A.A.

information with very many responding with a "Thumbs Up". Many people called me over to have a conversation about A.A. Numerous employees of the Restaurants asked for information for themselves and fellow workers/friends and I was able to hand them a Pamphlet from my pocket.

As I arrived back to the Festival, truly fulfilled with a personal feeling of worth for how I was spending my afternoon, I approached the Entrance/Exit of the Festival at 14th Street.

I spent the next two hours, standing back, on the walkway just outside the exit as the masses of people were leaving, giving most, each and everyone the opportunity to read the inviting information on the A.A. posters. Every 10 seconds I received a "Thumbs Up" or very sincere, verbal acknowledgment of my "contributions, kindness, etc. for my efforts" and other words of appreciation, that would continually warm my heart and lessen the pain of being on my feet for so long.

As the next two hours went by, with a continuous stream of people walking past me as many read the poster out loud, I had the opportunity to answer the questions and inquiries of so many. I learned that much of the alcohol within the Festival was being "given away freely". This was to became apparent as the last 45 minutes approached and the masses of people seemed to "thickened with inebriated drunken guests". I wondered to myself, "How many will proclaim that night or morning, that they need help and remember seeing the A.A. Poster". At least a thousand people read the poster that I wore on my front. They now know that if anyone reaches out to them for Help, A.A. is there to Help. How many people that viewed the sign on my backside, I will leave to your imagination. A number of persons and groups asked to take

a picture to post online and instagram. Many others took a picture from their tables or from afar. I know of one life that I definitely changed... Mine!

Most, if not all newcomers walk into an Alcoholics Anonymous Meeting thinking they are in an Alcoholics Anonymous Program. Not knowing they are among an Alcoholics Anonymous Fellowship that has a Twelve Step Program available for them. A lot of them never comeback when they feel Alcoholics Anonymous has failed them before they get a sponsor and work a step, not really understanding how A.A works. They may go out into the streets or go online and trash A.A because of this.

First, the Twelve steps of Alcoholics Anonymous has never failed anyone, you can only fail the steps by not applying them in your every day life after working them with a sponsor. What is a sponsor? A sponsor is someone who has completed or worked the Twelve Steps, an is willing to help and guide a newcomer through the Twelve steps. At most A.A Meetings you will recognize a sponsor at the end of a meeting, when they are ask to raise their hands.

I have sat in many A.A meetings over the years, and to this day when I am not paying attention, I can miss parts of the A.A Preamble when it states and reads: "Alcoholics Anonymous is a Fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength and hope with each other, that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism, the only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking".

When someone tells you this is there first A.A Meeting, whether if they are coming off the streets or fresh out of a treatment center. For those of us who came before the newcomer within the fellowship, I think it is extremely important to let the newcomer know a treatment center is a program, Alcoholics Anonymous is a Fellowship, not a program.

A Search for Humility and Happiness (Cont. from pg.2)

Happiness is not a goal, but it is the result of living right. A friend once shared at a meeting that, satisfying his wants will never make a person happy. Another person shared that she had read something that described it like this: "happiness is like a butterfly, the more you chase it, the farther away it gets, but when you stand still, it will and on your shoulder". If my motive is to create happiness, it's probably not going to happen. I believe that this perspective applies to Humility as well. I also believe that right living is a good start. I don't believe that anybody can claim humility for themselves, but we can see it in others, and it seems to be a byproduct of the way they live. I've known some humble people, in and outside of the program, and they all have some things in common: They seldom bring attention to themselves, they never criticize others, they are always comforting, and they are always an asset and never a liability. Humble people do the things they were taught as a child. They treat others with respect. They are trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind.... Sound familiar?

I learned it in the boy scouts. I learned the Golden Rule in church, but I was never strong enough to live by it. If you're not sure what you're supposed to be doing, Read the 11th Step Prayer in the 12&12 or The Boy Scouts Laws, or try practicing The Golden Rule. That should be a pretty good start. When I found Alcoholics Anonymous, I was reintroduced to these values and helped to rein in my ego, and today I am at peace with myself and with those around me. By Rick R.
