Where is the Hamburger? The Real Problem Lies Between Our Ears

The disease of alcoholism is difficult to understand in a world that looks at everything in a logical way. Many of the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, (A.A.) spend years struggling to find the answers to this complicated malady. Our behavior while drinking often becomes the focus of our attempt to deal with this problem. It is logical to think that a person can just quit drinking when it starts to become a problem, and we know that this kind of logic does not work on alcoholism, but why not? If you remove the alcohol from the equation, his problems should diminish and things should return to normal, right? That seems logical but the real problem lies between our ears.

I was listening to a local sportscaster on the radio one day talking about his sparse college days when he was cramming for exams and working long into the night. He got hungry and ran out to the market to pick up something he could heat up for a quick meal. He purchased a box of Hamburger Helper, ran back to the dorm, opened the package, and the first thing out of his mouth was, "Where's the hamburger"? He was not aware that there is no hamburger in Hamburger Helper. All the ingredients were there and all he needed to do was to add the hamburger; then he would have a meal. That scenario is like the way I have come to understand the disease of alcoholism. Many of us may have been alcoholics long before we ever took our first drink. All the ingredients of alcoholism were there, and all we needed to do was to add the alcohol; then, we had a meal. The ingredients for alcoholism are not all that obvious. They are often intangible; however, The Big Book and the 12&12 have addressed most of them. They are referred to as spiritual maladies, fears, immaturity, grandiosity, selfishness, dishonesty, guilt, shame etc.

HISTORY

When was the first AA Meeting?

Typically June 10, 1935, the day of Dr. Bob's last drink is considered the day that A.A. was founded.

When the first "meeting" was is less clear. At first it was Bill and Bob hanging out and looking for someone else they could help. Perhaps when they met with "A.A. Number Three", Bill D. in his hospital bed on June 26, 1935 counts as the first meeting. According to the story "Alcoholics Anonymous Number Three" in the second edition of the Big Book, A.A. Group Number 1 of Akron Ohio, started that day with that meeting in Akron's City Hospital.

Some might say the first meeting was when Dr. Bob •first met with Bill W. According to Dr. Bob's Story, they first : •met with Bill trying to help sober up Dr. Bob on Mother's Day• of 1935 which would have been May 12 at 5pm at the home of Henrietta Seiberling, a friend of Bob's wife. This house has come to be known as "The Gatehouse" and is in Akron. •Ohio. Dr. Bob drank after this meeting, but it was still the first meeting of two men talking about the program that was becoming Alcoholics Anonymous. Here is an excerpt from *Dr. Bob's Story: About this time a lady called up my wife one . Saturday afternoon, saying she wanted me to come over that evening to meet a friend of hers who might help me. It was the day before Mother's Day and I had come home plastered, carrying a big potted plant which I set down on the table and forthwith went upstairs and passed out. The •next day she called again. Wishing to be polite, though I felt very badly, I said, "Let's make the call," and extracted from my wife a promise that we would not stay over fifteen minutes. (We entered her house at exactly five o'clock and it was: •eleven fifteen when we left. I had a couple of shorter talks with this man afterward, and stopped drinking abruptly. This dry spell lasted for about three weeks; then I went to Atlan-'tic City to attend several days' meeting of a national society of which I was a member. I drank all the scotch they had on •the train and bought several quarts on my way to the hotel.



A Desire to Stop Drinking We Pick the Fruit Before it's Ripe

How disturbing it is to hear a member of A.A. with four- or five-years sobriety share at a meeting that Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) has an abysmal rate of success, and I wonder if he is in the same A.A. program that I am. I got sober in the late 60's and my copy of the Big Book (Alcoholics Anonymous) is the second edition and in the foreword to that issue it states that, "Of alcoholic who came to A.A. and really tried, 50% got sober at once and remained that way: 25% sobered up after some relapses", and it goes on to explain about the others. I'm not sure how scientific those numbers are but their estimates number over 75%. That sounds successful to me. The second edition was printed in 1955 and up to that time there was very little help for the alcoholic outside of A.A. In 1956 the American Medical Association (AMA) declared Alcoholism a disease and sometime after that happened rehabilitation clinics were being funded and many alcoholics were being sent there whether they wanted to quit drinking or not. Before 1970, very few alcoholics under the age of 40 came to A.A. and I was the youngest member in my home group for quite a while. Major drug addiction didn't rear its ugly head at A.A. meetings until the middle 1970s and many of those that called themselves alcoholic/addicts were much younger than the typical alcoholic, and I recognized that drug addiction progresses much faster than most cases of alcoholism. Another dynamic that must be included in the equation is the court system. It seems that before an alcoholic is sent to jail these days, they are given the option to attend so many A.A. meeting in place of jail time. That overshadows the main requirement to become an A.A. member." The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking." I believe that A.A. is flooded with addict/alcoholics who have been sent to us long before they suffer the desperation and desire to stop drinking or using, and that we embrace them with this compassion and understanding.

With that in mind, I believe that A.A. does more today than we did in the days when only those who had a serious desire to quit drinking showed up at our doors. I am sometimes misunderstood when I try to explain these things, as I see them, and I don't want to see Alcoholics Anonymous being misrepresented. I believe that, of those who come to us with a desire to stop drinking, the success ratio remains the same as it always has been but, for those who have been sent here through the courts or the rehab programs, how many of them truly have a desire to stop drinking (or using)? When I greet a new-comer to a meeting I usually ask him/her," What brings you to A.A.?" About 9 out of ten will say the courts, or other influences. The one that says, "I just can't live this way anymore." I believe, has a 75% chance of staying sober for the rest of their life. We, in A.A; do not discriminate against those that are sent here through those outside programs.

We welcome them with open arms and give the best we can. I believe that 4 out of five at any given meeting were initially introduced to A.A. just that way. The Meetings were much smaller before the influx from those outside programs, but the rate of relapse is much higher now. Consider the fact that many of those members may never have made it here on their own, and that would be truly tragic. An old country boy name Named Phil when asked, "Why do we have so many relapses in A.A.?" replied, "Well, sometimes we pick the fruit before it's ripe". That's exactly the point I wanted to make. We do, often pick the fruit before it's ripe but we never discard it.





These things, and many other subtler issues, are the root cause of our inability to function without the use of alcohol (or other mind-altering drugs). The term "mind altering" is a clue to where the trouble starts.

I believe that alcohol worked temporarily by the relief it gave me as it masked all those irrational fears that we alcoholics experience and the peace of mind we experienced midway through our second drink. (So, to speak) Alcoholism is a progressive disease and it requires us to increase our intake to keep up with that progression until we are out of control, and try as we might, we can never regain that control.

That is the delusion that all alcoholics are faced with, and I am not sure that any of us can pick the day that we can abandon that delusion but when that day comes, if we remove the alcohol from the menu, but fail to address the other difficult ingredients, in a systematic way, we have little chance of experiencing a happy and successful recovery. Just knowing about them is not enough. We will need to practice the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous on every one of these destructive character traits if we are to experience the freedom of the spirit that we all seek.

Our problems did not just appear, they have evolved over a long period of time, and it will take time to heal them. Patience, perseverance, unselfishness, understanding, faith, honesty; these are a few of the new ingredients that we will need to add to our plate if we plan to be around when the desert is being served.


